HUL 258: Social and Political Philosophy IInd Semester, 2017-18

Course description

This is a general introduction to some core themes in social and political philosophy. In the first part of the course we will explore the nature and limits of the philosophical position known as *utilitarianism*, and use it to draw connections between philosophy and the discipline of economics, particularly with respect to the study of well-being and aggregation.

In the second part of the course we will be concerned with the idea of individual freedom, and ask: what are the nature and limits of the authority of society and the State over the individual? This question will be addressed by a detailed consideration of John Stuart Mill's "Harm Principle."

In the third part of the course, we will apply the lessons of the first two parts to examine contemporary debates on freedom in India, particularly those concerning freedom of speech.

Expectations and pre-requisities

There are no prerequisites, but be warned that this is a demanding, reading-intensive course. The amount of reading for each lecture is likely to be no more than 5-10 pages, but the material is dense and will require multiple reading: expect to read each assigned reading at least two-three times in order to grasp it.
